Election Day • November 7

There are four Wallace Town Council seats on the ballot on November 7. Three town council members are up for re-election. Mayor Pro-Tem Francisco Rivas-Diaz, Councilman Jeff Carter, and Councilman Frank Brinkley are all on the ballot to retain their seats. In addition, Penny Thorne is also running for a town council position.



Clement Park Plans

With the second phase of Farrior Park at Boney Mill approaching completion, the Parks and Recreation team is gearing up to initiate a fresh PARTF grant application for improvements to Clement Park.

At present, the Clement Park Community Center is in the midst of renovations, which will provide modernized meeting spaces for nonprofit organizations and a venue for future park and town events. This project will serve as a catalyst for the realization of other upgrades planned for the park.

The town is consolidating various initiatives, including an inclusive playground, essential improvements to the tennis courts, and other ideas like additions of pickle ball courts and a splash pad, into a comprehensive master plan for Clement Park.

Community input will be actively sought, allowing residents to contribute their preferences for the park's development. The preliminary budget for these endeavors is set at \$750,000.

The planning phase has already commenced, with an application to the state Parks and Recreation Trust Fund expected to be submitted in the spring.

Existing playground equipment Clement Park that will be replaced by the inclusive playground, will find new life, and reinstalled at Dobbins Park.

Wallace Police personnel will be attending "The Intersection of the First and Fourth Amendments" training at Wake Technical College in Raleigh on November 14th. The Fourth Amendment deals with the use of search warrants and has been at the heart of many court cases as technology has evolved.

In the Plans?

Planning Director Rod Fritz addressed Town Council on the question of allowing ground floor residential apartments in the Downtown Business District. The subject is being pursued in response to a request by the developer who purchased the 2 story former Market Furniture building on East Main St.

The building is a shell, and will require almost a total re-build. This would allow for the sprinkler systems needed for residential use to be installed both upstairs and downstairs easily and cost effectively, which is not the case with some other downtown buildings.

Because of the size of the building it will be difficult to find a tenant to take all of the ground floor space, so being able to utilize some of the space as apartments may be a way to better utilize thespace.

In researching the proposal, Fritz reached out to surrounding towns and the Cape Fear Council for Government. Burgaw, Elizabethtown and Wilmington do not allow ground level apartments. Dunn allows them above or behind - but not with street facing access. Carolina Beach has a mixed-use plan that was frowned upon by the Cape Fear Council of Government.

Things that were considered by the Wallace Planning Board were insurance costs, fire hazards, utilities that would need to be built for water, sewer and trash and the need for parking.

After hearing from the developer and Fritz, Town Council decided to send the question back to the planning board, for additional discussion and final determination from them before voting on the proposal.

In the Works!

Public Services Director Brent Dean updated Town Council on the projects his department has been working on.

- Since the town re-instituted Animal Control, they have captured 19 cats and 2 dogs. Animals are transported to the Duplin County Animal Shelter.
- The department set up road control for "Downtown Get Down" and will again for "Christmas at Twilight".
- The department will put up snowflakes and flags both downtown and on 117 in early November and install the town Christmas Tree and Santa House closer to "Christmas at Twilight".
 - · Water wells 15 & 16 are on schedule.
- Sloan St. is next up for utility repair and re-paving. Work on Raleigh St. cannot begin until after a slipline project is complete.
- The Rockfish Creek clean out project is complete and will assist water flow.
- The project to map the town's storm water system is 80% complete.
- There is a weekly schedule for filling pot holes and trimming trees.
- The storm drain on Cliff St. is being repaired.
- The owner of the Ollie's Shopping Center has contracted to have the street cleaner clean their parking lot.

Political Yard Signs

Political campaign signs are permitted in the right of way for 30 days prior to election day, and must be removed by 10 days after the election.

The town was thrilled to recently receive notice that we were awarded a total of \$15 million in the state budget that just passed for 2023/2024.

Of the \$15 million total, \$10 million was awarded for continued airport expansion. The additional \$5 million was granted for building the new public safety facilities.

We are thankful to our state officials, Senator Brent Jackson and Representative Jimmy Dixon for assisting us in obtaining this much needed funding.
